Dismantling Racism Checklist

Virginia Organizing is committed to working organizationally to combat racism in all its forms. As a part of that commitment, we are printing the following list of things – large and small – that you can do to combat racism in your own life and in your community. This list is not meant to be complete, but rather a jumping off place for your own ideas and efforts.

Individual

Patronize businesses owned and operated by people of color.

Inventory your books, videos, music, and the pictures on your walls: are people of color represented in positive ways?

Learn to confront racist remarks.

Give a friend a copy of a book on race issues you found helpful.

Let people know that you are not interested in hearing demeaning ethnic or racial jokes.

Attend a workshop on dismantling racism.

Subscribe to a publication that deals with race issues.

Celebrate the holidays of other ethnic and racial groups.

Send a financial contribution to an organization that is actively working on race issues.

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Group

Get all the employers in your community to pay a living wage to all workers. For the University of Virginia, contact Teresa Sullivan, president, at tas6n@eservices.virginia.edu

Get non-profits and houses of worship to invest their reserve funds and endowments in affordable housing for low-and moderate-income people of color.

Get together your family, friends, and neighbors to commit to ask their bank how many loans they make to people of color, and how many employees of color they have.

Get members of your group to serve on boards and commissions – local or state – to make their voices heard in challenging racist systems.

Attend school board meetings and voice your ideas about curriculum changes, hiring decisions, and other issues related to dismantling racism.

Provide information to your employer about fair hiring practices and non-biased interviewing (and anyone who may be interviewing job candidates).

Get an organization to which you belong to sponsor a discussion on race issues in your community.

Put together a lending library on race issues for your workplace, community centers or house of worship.
